ACVO Community & Coast Fund - Year 2 Now Open for Submissions

Applications are now open for the second year of the Community & Coast Fund with £100,000 available to support community projects in Torry and Cove.

Managed by ACVO and building on the success of its pilot year, community organisations are now invited to submit applications for projects that align with at least one of the Community & Coast <u>six pillars</u>.

This year, projects that address community safety, social isolation, mental health, and opportunities for engagement are encouraged to apply.

St Fittick's Church Investigative Works

In conversation with Joanne McLelland, Conservation Accredited Architect RIBA RIAS ARB and founder of not-for-profit Eala Impacts CIC, who is leading the investigation works at St Fittick's Church that took place in September under the supervision of Historic Environment Scotland.



What were the aims of the investigations?

"The small opening up works aimed to confirm the condition of the stone behind the cement harling. This was so we could identify the work required to repair the church and inform the broader Scheduled Monument Consent."

What were the key findings?

"The most exciting find was that the some of the lime 'tec' coat pointing – the lime mortar closest to the surface – was still intact. This is mortar from masons hundreds of years ago, and it's always great to find material this old. Alongside this, we found that some of the stone was worse than we expected, and some was better, but across the piece what we had assumed would be needed was about right."

Why is it important to do the conservation works?

"St Fittick's Church is a Scheduled Monument and helps to tell the story of the community around it. Sadly, the use of cement in the harling in the 20th century has led to the stone structure deteriorating and if that isn't attended to, over time, it could be lost completely. This is a great opportunity to help it endure into the future."

Community Project Spotlight

The Denis Law Legacy Trust (DLLT) has installed a secure shipping container next to the Cruyff Court Neale Cooper at Tullos Playing Fields. Serving as a dedicated storage unit, the installation supports the Trust's expanding programme of activities for young people in the Torry area.

Outlines Creative, an Aberdeen-based street art CIC, led a youth consultation during DLLT's summer community day, to gather ideas from local young people about how they envisioned the container's appearance. Based on their input, Outlines Creative returned with a series of vibrant mock-up designs and collaborated with a young girls' group, who have been actively involved with DLLT, to help bring those designs to life, alongside the artists.

Skills and Learning

Energy Transition Skills Hub Launches in Altens



Scotland's largest Energy Transition Skills Hub was officially opened on the 29th of September by First Minister John Swinney MSP. The state-of-the-art facility features a welding academy, advanced manufacturing zone, and future technology digital training suites.

Energy Transition Vehicle Visiting Schools



The 'Energy on the Move' outreach vehicle began its school tour with over 25 schools booked in this academic year. Housing the 'Net Zero Challenge', the vehicle expands into a mobile classroom, providing a unique learning experience for the next generation.

By refurbishing an existing building, within a formerly derelict brownfield site, carbon emissions were 50% less than a new build, and the facility operates to the latest energy efficiency standards by integrating heat pumps and solar panels.

The Hub is providing accessible training for students, blending full-time opportunities for upskilling and reskilling through part-time, evening and weekend courses.

The innovative vehicle is a repurposed 7.5-tonne lorry that transforms into a bespoke learning environment with extended platforms and a glass front. It uses a hydrogen dual-fuel engine to significantly reduce its emissions, and learners can see the hydrogen storage tanks displayed on board.

Operated by NESCol, 'Energy on the Move' is available to visit schools in Aberdeen and Aberdeenshire, as well as events across Scotland.
